If you want to experience how good life can be, Denmark is one of your choices you should consider. harbor with colorful houses. There are many good restaurants along the harbor, though most of them were quite expensive. Moreover, before going to visit the attractions in the city, it is recommended to check the opening hours and entrance fee because the opening time may change according to the season and there might be a certain day in a week that the entrance will be free.

Studying in Copenhagen Business School is a challenge for us. There are both similarities and differences between CBS and TU. All the handouts, works or any announcements

are being done through student online service. It is easy for students to check the class or contact the teacher wherever they are. Students do not require to attend the class; however, teacher usually encourages students to participate in class by assigning group work. Majority of the subjects at CBS are using 100% final exam which can be considered as risk, which you may get any grade since you do not know each teacher's style, and also reward, since you can travel during the semester and pay



attention only the period before exam. At CBS, you can also request for retake exam in case you get an F or request to do so. It is usually an take home assignment but still depends on teacher.



As everyone might expect, being an exchange student in Europe would give you a benefit in travelling to other countries in Europe with only one visa needed. We have been to many European countries including Germany, Netherlands, France, Spain, Italy, Norway, Sweden and etc. It might sound a lot but if you were there, there would be no limit for travel. When you went to other countries, you can learn different cultures, see different point of view, and also learn how to survive when any unexpected event occur. Luckily,

we didn't face any terrible situation. The most important you need to do when you want travel is PLAN. The ealier you plan, the more you can save your money. Since Copenhagen is quite far away from other countries in Europe (it takes almost 5 hours by train to go to Hamburg, the nearest German city), the most convenience way is by plane. There are 2 main low cost airlines that we usually use, Easyjet and Norwegian. The flight price usually increases when the date is approaching. You can save a lot of money by just planning.
