Before Departure

- For accommodation, there are two main providers; SiO (housing for Oslo students) and BSN (for BI students only). BSN is located right across the campus. It's only 5-minute walk. SiO operates dormitories in many locations. The most popular one is Kringsja Student Village. It's about 15 minutes away by metro. But you can enjoy many types of activities there such as strolling around the lake, going cross country skiing and playing football. I would really like to recommend this place. - 3. When it comes to applying for visa, you have to submit your documents through VFS global (<u>www.vsfglobal.com</u>). Then you'll get a temporary visa. When you arrive in Norway, you'll need to report at the UDI to get a permanent student residence permit. See more information at <u>www.udi.no</u>.

Don't be surprised if it gets really quiet in the city. Most of people are up in the winter park or some hilly areas to enjoy outdoor winter sports.

Another popular activity is hiking to the top of the pulpit rock or "Preikestolen" in Norwegian. It's 604 meters above the sea level. Generally, it takes around 2 hours to get up there. When you reach to the top, you'll see one of the most beautiful fjords of Norway.
